Week Ending January 17, 2025

2025 Session Kicks Off

The legislature convened on January 13th for the first session of the Georgia General Assembly's 2025-2026 term. It will meet for 40 Legislative Days with adjournment scheduled for April 4th. As planned, Speaker Jon Burns was reelected as Speaker to preside over the House during the next two years. On the Senate side, Senator John Kennedy was reelected President Pro-Tem. State of the State Address

Governor Kemp delivered his seventh State of the State Address to a joint session of the General Assembly on Thursday. Among his initiatives highlighted in his speech was his proposal to further cut state income tax rates by 20 basis points, bringing the rate down to 5.19%. <u>Click here</u> to read the speech in its entirety.

Track Budget Changes

The easiest way to find and keep up with budget line items throughout the process is via the budget tracking documents. They list only new line items and those current line items that are being reduced or increased. FYA 2025 or FY 2026.

We Can All Agree

Legislators, agency staff, lobbyists, and all others can agree on <u>SR 6</u> – it is the Resolution that sets the calendar for the duration of the session. Day 40 Sine Die (last legislative day) is scheduled for April 4th. This year is the third consecutive year House and Senate Leadership came together for the good of the order by setting the entire calendar in advance.

Infrastructure Spending

Governor Kemp is recommending spending one billion dollars of surplus funds in infrastructure improvements. The proposal includes \$530 million for the state's freight and logistics network, \$250 million in local grants for road construction, \$250 million for water and sewage

improvement, \$60 million for the infrastructure bank program and \$98 million to GDoT to replace revenue lost by the motor fuel excise tax suspension.

Tort Reform

Governor Kemp has proclaimed tort reform his top priority whether it's this legislative session, or perhaps a second one later this year (threat of a special session). Speaker Burns said he will pursue measures that return balance to our courtrooms and stability to our insurance markets. We expect to have legislation introduced in the next week or two.

Fulton County DA Willis

The Senate voted on Monday to reauthorize a committee formed last year to investigate Fulton County District Attorney Fani Willis' role in the Georgia election interference case against Donald Trump. Senator Greg Dolezal, the Committee's chairman, said the committee still has unfinished business.

Committee Assignments
