More Inclement Weather

The traditional joint House – Senate budget hearings usually held Tuesday through Thursday after the MLK Holiday were canceled due to another arctic blast. Capitol Hill was shut down through Wednesday. In a reversal of the usual pattern, the latest winter storm dumped more snow on Middle and South Georgia than the northern half of the state. The National Weather Service meteorologist in Peachtree City said it's the arctic air pushing through the Gulf that's bringing the unusual pattern.

A statewide state of emergency will be in effect through January 28, which prohibits price gouging, suspends hours-of-service limitations for commercial vehicle operators involved in the storm response, and temporarily increases weight, height, and length limits for commercial vehicles transporting emergency supplies.

The Capitol came back to life on Thursday with a few committee meetings and then went quiet again Friday as members headed back to their home districts.

Trade Mission

Governor Kemp left for Europe this week on a trade mission to Germany and Poland. The trip is intended to strengthen existing economic and cultural ties with the two countries and develop new relationships that will create jobs. Germany is the fourth-largest export and import market for Georgia, with more than \$12.8 billion in trade moving back and forth in 2023.

Next Week

The legislature will crank back up Monday for Day 6 and play catch up on budget sub-committee hearings in addition to the usual standing committee meetings. They will remain in session through Thursday before taking a recess day on Friday.
